#### Bishopric Message

Dear Garden Park ward.

My grandfather Ted Peterson was a B-17 pilot during World War II. During a bombing mission over the Nazi submarine pens in St. Nazaire, France, his plane was shot down, and he parachuted into a small village called Saint Quay. For three terrifying months, he was pursued by German forces, evading capture by hiding out in ravines, cellars, and even a tuberculosis asylum. It was a horrific experience for a young man in his early twenties, who spoke no French or German but understood the potential lethality of his situation. Ted had the good fortune of connecting with a French family that was involved with the French Resistance. They helped smuggle him under a truckload of potatoes to Southern France, where he began an 11-day hike over the Pyrenees Mountains to freedom in Spain.

Tea's terrifying months in France have given rise to a deep and beautiful friendship between my family and the French family who helped Ted escape. The relationship has spanned four generations, with families on both sides of the Atlantic naming children after individuals on the other side. I was reminded of that dramatic shift from terror to warmth and beauty this week when I discovered a poem by Rainer Rilke that reads in part:

God speaks to each of us as he makes us, then walks with us silently out of the night.

These are the words we dimly hear:

Let everything happen to you: beauty and terror. Just keep going. No feeling is final. Don't let yourself lose me.

Give me your hand.


All of the feelings we experience--beauty and terror, triumph and exhaustion, jealousy, peace, anger, and doubt—are part of the human experience for which we were made. None of them is permanent, and as we are taught in D&C 122, "all these things shall give thee experience, and shall be for thy good. The Son of Man hath descended below them all."

I'm so glad my grandfather just kept going, not only through those months in France, but throughout his life. Through trials and triumphs, he never let himself lose touch with his maker.



#### **Service Opportunity**

The First Presidency has recently approved, and the Utah Area Presidency supports, a project to sew **5 million** urgently needed medical-grade face masks for health care providers in hospitals and other medical facilities. The Relief Society is a cosponsor of this project, which is a partnership between Latter-day Saint Charities, Intermountain Healthcare, and University of Utah Health.

**Ten thousand** volunteers per week are needed to sew 100 masks from precut, medicalgrade fabric, distributed in kits at selected Deseret Industries stores. This will be repeated for five weeks and begins next Tuesday, April 21.

Those who are available for 10-15 hours during the week and have sewing skills and a sewing machine are invited to sign up!



I will prepare to become a diligent missionary, loyal husband, and loving father by being a true disciple of Jesus Christ.


I will help prepare the world for the Savior's return by inviting all to come unto Christ and receive the blessings of His Atonement.

#### Sunday School

### A few lessons relevant to our times, from this weeks Come Follow Me study. Mosiah 18 through 24

In Mosiah 18:8-10, Alma and his people are gathered at the waters of baptism. We are reminded of the covenant that we make at the time of baptism:

8 And it came to pass that he said unto them: Behold, here are the waters of Mormon (for thus were they called) and now, as ye are desirous to come into the fold of God, and to be called his people, and are willing to bear one another's burdens, that they may be light;

9 Yea, and are willing to mourn with those that mourn; yea, and comfort those that stand in need of comfort, and to stand as witnesses of God at all times and in all things, and in all places that ye may be in, even until death, that ye may be redeemed of God, and be numbered with those of the first resurrection, that ye may have eternal life—

As the consequences of the pandemic effect those around us, some are fearful, some have lost loved ones, some are ill, and some have lost employment.

We, as the people of God can be there to bear one another's burdens, mourn each other's losses and comfort as needed.

As we do so, he will pour out his Spirit more abundantly in our lives and in the lives of those we serve.

In Mosiah 21 and 24 the people of Limhi and the people of Alma are in bondage to the Lamanites. In these Chapters, we learn some of the ways that God delivers his people from their iniquities.

#### Mosiah 21:13-17

13 And they did humble themselves even to the dust, subjecting themselves to the yoke of bondage, submitting themselves to be smitten, and to be driven to and fro, and burdened, according to the desires of their enemies.

14 And they did humble themselves even in the depths of humility; and they did cry mightily to God; yea, even all the day long did they cry unto their God that he would deliver them out of their afflictions.

15 And now the Lord was slow to hear their cry because of their iniquities; nevertheless the Lord did hear their cries, and began to soften the hearts of the Lamanites that they began to ease their burdens; yet the Lord did not see fit to deliver them out of bondage.

16 And it came to pass that they began to prosper by degrees in the land, and began to raise grain more abundantly, and flocks, and herds, that they did not suffer with hunger.

17 Now there was a great number of women, more than there was of men; therefore king Limhi commanded that every man should impart to the support of the widows and their children, that they might not perish with hunger; and this they did because of the greatness of their number that had been slain.

Sometimes the Lord seems slow to hear our cries. Sometimes he does not see fit to deliver in the timeframe we expect. Sometimes he answers our prayers in degrees. Sometimes the slow pace of his deliverance teaches us and changes who we are.

### Sunday School (continued)

In chapter 22, Gideon offers a plan for escape. They are finally delivered.

In chapter 24 we learn of the bondage, suffering and deliverance of the people of Alma. Mosiah 24:10-16

10 And it came to pass that so great were their afflictions that they began to cry mightily to God.

11 And Amulon commanded them that they should stop their cries; and he put guards over them to watch them, that whosoever should be found calling upon God should be put to death.

12 And Alma and his people did not raise their voices to the Lord their God, but did pour out their hearts to him; and he did know the thoughts of their hearts.

13 And it came to pass that the voice of the Lord came to them in their afflictions, saying: Lift up your heads and be of good comfort, for I know of the covenant which ye have made unto me; and I will covenant with my people and deliver them out of bondage.

14 And I will also ease the burdens which are put upon your shoulders, that even you cannot feel them upon your backs, even while you are in bondage; and this will I do that ye may stand as witnesses for me hereafter, and that ye may know of a surety that I, the Lord God, do visit my people in their afflictions.

15 And now it came to pass that the burdens which were laid upon Alma and his brethren were made light; yea, the Lord did strengthen them that they could bear up their burdens with ease, and they did submit cheerfully and with patience to all the will of the Lord.

16 And it came to pass that so great was their faith and their patience that the voice of the Lord came unto them again, saying: Be of good comfort, for on the morrow I will deliver you out of bondage.


In our day, we cry unto the Lord for relief from the pandemic. We pray for miracles that may not be realized in the timeframe or way that we expect.




